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President's Remarks

The Laidlaw Foundation is about creating opportunity for youth. The highlight of 2013 was a strategic planning process that involved consultations with all our stakeholders — youth, partners, staff. They helped us set a plan targeted at partnering with young people and making systemic change. I can safely predict that in 2014 this page will be a report on the results of our first year of experience with the new plan and the many many people involved. 2013 is unusual for Laidlaw because the highlight involves two special people: Nathan Gilbert and Jehad Aliweiwi — both committed to youth and both Executive Directors of our Foundation.

Nathan retired in 2013 after 31 years leading the Laidlaw Foundation. He has long been a passionate advocate for youth, particularly youth in care, in both his professional and personal life. If Laidlaw is about opportunity for youth, it long had an executive director who lived that philosophy as an Executive Director, as a parent, and for many, as a friend. We not only wish him well, but, as we will formally announce at our Annual General Meeting, the Foundation will recognize Nathan's commitment to youth by creating youth fellowships named in his honour. In this way, he will continue to be a part of our strategic plan for years to come.

In December 2013, the Board hired Jehad as Nathan's successor. Jehad comes to Laidlaw from Thorncliffe Neighbourhood Services, an organization he ran and grew for 9 years. One of the reference checks I performed was memorable: John, this referee said, people with money go to Jehad to get things done. This sentiment echoed what the Board was seeing in the interview process: a commitment to youth and community, together with a passion for operational excellence that get things done. Well, that's good, because we are not naming anything after Jehad until he gets lots of things done. And that will be the story of 2014 and beyond.

I want to thank the people who made the transition year possible. A change in leadership is not an easy time for staff members. Wanda, Violetta, Ana, Denis and Susan have the Board's thanks for keeping us moving and granting through the year. Our granting partners have also stood by us through this period and we appreciate your commitment. We are looking forward to partnering with you to implement our strategic plan.

Strategic planning and leadership change are demanding business for boards and I thank the members of our board for seeing it through from beginning to end. Yes, I said end. Now, we implement. On to 2014!

Youth Organizing Program

In 2012, our strategic plan that put young people and youth-led community change at the centre of all the Foundation's work came to an end. As we moved into 2013 and the development of our next strategic plan, it very quickly became apparent that the Foundation's commitment to young people and supporting youth-led and youth-driven community change was deepening. For close to 15 years, the Foundation has supported youth-led groups through various incarnations of funding programs. What we continue to see are young people with real and innovative strategies that address systemic issues that shape the lives of their peers, families and communities. In local, often immediate ways, youth-led groups are modelling what inclusive and accessible education, social service, training/employment, health and justice systems can be. At the core of the Foundations 2014-2018 strategic plan is a continued commitment to supporting youth-led community change and a renewed focus on investing in research, policy and advocacy.

2013 Funding Updates:

In 2013, 17 youth-led groups were funded. Many of the projects focused on creating exchanges of ideas and experiences between different communities of young These included efforts to build connections between young people in people. Toronto and young people in rural Northern communities through community arts; efforts to connect young people from newcomer communities with Indigenous youth through dialogue focused on reconciliation; enabling young people's lived experiences to be shared through conversations about their health; raising awareness of the experiences of young people with disabilities who are facing mental health challenges; and strategies to promote greater understanding of complex and personal experiences with sexual health. Inclusive and accessible education was a central aspect of several projects. These projects focused on ways to support young people who are not thriving in the formal education system, to reconnect to their education in empowering ways. You can read a brief description of each YO grantee at the end of this report.

Youth Social Infrastructure Program

The Youth Social Infrastructure Program (YSI) strategy funds infrastructure to support the work of youth organizers (funded by the Youth Organizing Program). The YSI also acts as a learning partner with young people and institutions to identify and implement deliberate support for the development and sustainability of social infrastructure. In 2013, we continued to explore, share and expand our reach through collaborative efforts with grassroots and institutional partners. Grants were allocated to Manifesto Community Arts, Frontline Partners with Youth Network (FPYN), ArtReach Toronto, Tides Canada Initiatives - The Base, the Youth Social Infrastructure Collaborative with a new northern hub in Algoma, the ArtDada data visualization project and Sketch. A brief description of these initiatives is at the end of this report.

What began as an experiment in emergence and innovation, the YSI Collaborative http://www.youthsi.org/index.html gained growing momentum by expanding its provincial reach and core team membership. The Collaborative seeks to amplify and accelerate the innovative youth organizing & community change work happening across the province. Groups and individuals who have networked with the YSI Collaborative identify it as central to the work of measuring the collective impact of the youth organizing sector in Ontario. Now, after 4-years, Collaborative members have begun to identify significant shifts in how they manage their programming, organizational structures, governance, and how they engage their stakeholders in decision-making. By demonstrating different ways of working together through the YSI collaborative, the YSI members have begun to work and think differently, and to see the possibilities of participatory leadership. 2013 saw the collaborative starting to embed a developmental evaluation framework into its operations that will allow them to identify and share the impact of their initiatives.

In 2013 we continued to support Shared Administrative Platforms that provide administrative support and an organizational home to initiatives that would otherwise be unincorporated. Beyond financial and administrative support, many Shared Platforms offer training, mentorship and other supports to these initiatives. Shared Platforms enable groups to organize around societal concerns without having to divert energy and resources into setting up a separate organization. The platform model broadens the reach and potential impact that groups can have in the communities they work in because they leverage the expertise of community leaders, increase resident participation and access to the expertise of organizations offering the administrative support.



NATHAN GILBERT



In 1982 Nick Laidlaw hired 30 year old Nathan Gilbert, a graduate of the University of Toronto's Faculty of Social Work. Nick and Nathan developed a professional partnership into a caring friendship until Nick's death in 1990. In his 31 year span, Nathan continued Nick's pioneering work in transforming this private family foundation into a public interest one.

Nathan was instrumental in the development and administration of many programs for which the Foundation became well known and respected: in the performing arts field, the Foundation became instrumental in the creation of a canon of new works that reflected

Canadians to themselves and Nathan was a fixture in theatres throughout the city and the Province seeing much of the work that was funded over a period of 25 years; children at risk were always a preoccupation for the Foundation and personally for Nathan who had a huge compassion for children in care and was concerned about the environmental impacts on children's health. Over the years he developed extensive national and regional networks in the policy, research and practice fields of the Foundation's focus areas.

Nathan oversaw many educational initiatives during his tenure and was also committed to incubating projects that shared Foundation interests and values such as the Sustainability Network and ArtReach Toronto.

In 1999, to mark the Foundation's 50th anniversary, Nathan co-edited, Making Change: Fifty Years of the Laidlaw Foundation (ECW Press: 2001), a record of the foundation's work and the impact it has had on social, cultural and environmental causes. It is also a testament to Nathan's institutional memory, a trait that many of his colleagues admire in him.



Nathan has never wavered from his core values of diversity, transparency, respect, intergenerational reciprocity and inclusion. He is a passionate advocate for young people and their role in society as contributors and change makers. We wish him well in the future.

The model aims to build a regionally-focused, nationally-connected network of CoPilots equipped with the supports, tools, and resources they need to amplify the impact of changemakers they enable through a focus on "Hacking Self & Hacking Systems" (personal and systems transformation) - the critical ingredients of holistic, meaningful, and sustainable impact. Manifesto Community Projects is a non-profit grassroots organization that works to unite, energize, support and celebrate Toronto's vibrant and diverse music and arts community, and find innovative ways of working together towards common goals. Manifesto aims to provide a platform and the resources needed to advance the growth of the arts as a tool for positive change on the individual, community and city level (reaching across the GTA, Canada and in recent years, further afield, such as Manifesto Jamaica). Manifesto focuses on youth and has its origins in hip hop culture, harking back to the roots of hip hop that was full of expression, creativity and had the potential to be transformative. Manifesto's newly revised mission statement is to: Unite, inspire and empower diverse communities of young people through arts and culture. It completed a strategic planning process in 2012, that will carry them into the next 5 years. As a result of the planning process, a revised organizational structure and programming plan are being implemented in 2013. Manifesto will focus on organizational development as it creates the structures and policies to carry a maturing organization. Manifesto has also been developing a social enterprise stream to ensure a sustained and strong non-profit. \$80,000

The Green Room - Infrastructure for Youth Organizing in the Arts

SKETCH is a community-arts space that creates opportunities for marginally housed and homeless people ages 15-29, to engage in the arts in a cross-disciplinary studio environment or in the community. SKETCH has successfully created an environment where young people can debate, collaborate, explore their talents, dream and figure out ways to impact their communities. SKETCH continues to create relevant and accessible social infrastructure to support youth organizing in the arts, among young people who live with many barriers including homelessness, street involvement, stigma and marginalization. All infrastructure, all support and all the organizing is based in community arts practice. \$85,000

ArtReach provides capacity building initiatives that aim to strengthen the community of youth and young artists working towards social change in Toronto.
